Kokomo School Corporation Head Start serves 380 children and their families in Howard, Miami and Tipton

counties. Our average enrollment is 100 % and is composed of all Head Start eligible students.

Our school year operates from August to May, 5 days a week. We follow Kokomo School Corporation calendar. Additionally, we offer a one month "Jump Start" summer school program each year. Our fiscal year is January 1st to December 31st.

Education Outcomes

Galileo Assessments and Brigance developmental screens are used to triangulate and get baseline data. Zoo Phonics is a supplemental early literacy curriculum used by the program. These programs are tracked again mid-year and at the end of the year to show academic and social growth.











Family Outcomes

- 403 enrolled students and their families received some type of services such as parent education, help with housing, finding a doctor, dentist or other social services
- 62 participated in Fatherhood Initiative Activities
- ★ 411 total program volunteers (331 of which were current or past Head Start parents)

Child and Family Literacy

Kokomo School Corporation Head Start offers numerous literacy activities for children and families. Students listened to various storytellers; Extension Homemakers came to the classrooms and read to the students, and then gave each student a book to take home. Students participated in Young Authors Conference; Author Buck Wilder chose KSC Head Start as the special school of choice to visit and present his children's books. Education Managers planned Book-It and Dr. Seuss week. Families attended Pajama Literacy Night where they heard stories, participated in finger plays and songs, and even made gingerbread houses. Each student took a book home from the event. Teachers also partnered with the Howard County Public Library for a literacy exchange program.

Audit/Review— Our triennial Review was conducted in October 2013. Our program was in total compliance. There were no corrective actions required. Two of the areas of strength identified were innovative initiatives to improve health and wellness of staff, students and families, and KSC Head Start was recognized for our strong community partnerships. We maintained Level 4 in Indiana's Paths to Quality Early Childhood rating system for 2016. The Program is in year one of the new five year grant.

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Children with Disabilities



Head Start Regulations require that at least 10% of the enrollment must be made available to children with disabilities. Kokomo School Corporation Head Start works closely with LEA's (Local Education Agencies) to provide services to students at all of our sites.

The 2015-2016 school year served

August — 25 children with disabilities with an IEP

May — 70 children identified with disabilities/IEP

*18% of students served had recorded disabilities
